

WELCOME TO OUR 2023-2024 ANNUAL REPORT

It's my pleasure to bring to you, my first report as Officer in Charge of Wellington Volunteer Fire Service Support Unit (known as Wellington Operational Support Unit), as we celebrate our 125th year of providing service to the people of Wellington.

It was another busy year, with our brigade taking a full part in Fire and Emergency's operations and events across Wellington and, despite a period of significant change, we are well placed to continue our service.

LEADERSHIP CHANGES

You will recall from last year's report that Jono Ashman had stood down from the role of SSO / OIC and that during a transitional period, Station Officer Phil Harris and myself were providing brigade leadership; I also reported that Jono had returned to the brigade (in the role of Station Officer) as of early September.

During September, a competitive process led by our Group Manager, AAC Mike Dombroski, was run to select a new Senior Station Officer / Officer in Charge. In early October, I was privileged enough to be selected for the role, and I have set about since then to move us forward from a relatively unsettled early 2023. This has not been without some challenges, however!

Unfortunately in late October, due to his personal circumstances, SO Jono Ashman resigned entirely from the brigade. I want to again note my thanks to Jono for his service to our brigade, and his support and friendship over the last several years.

Jono's departure left the brigade with only two Officers and a bit of a leadership vacuum. One of my first moves in response was to finalise, and obtain executive approval for, the WOSU-developed rank progression framework to enable the appointment of Operational Support Senior Firefighter (OS-SFF) rank within our brigade. This then enabled us to promote two of the brigade's emerging leaders, Cullum Peni-Wesche and Simon Luke, to the SFF rank and enable them to more directly support Phil and myself in a leadership capacity. We were also able to celebrate the promotion of Zane Hunt to Qualified Firefighter (OS-QFF) at the same time, which reflected his commitment to the brigade after his transfer to us in December 2022.

As we entered 2024 I began to look toward the appointment of additional Station Officers; with a brigade establishment of 25, the normal complement would be four SO's in addition to the SSO, and this left three vacancies to potentially be filled! It was my pleasure to be able to appoint Alex Cousins, Simon Luke and Cullum Peni-Wesche to the rank of OS-SO in July 2024; though this is beyond the official period of this report, it is a noteworthy achievement and each of them are already making a significant contribution to brigade. Congratulations to all three of you.

OPERATIONAL ACTIVITY

We were dispatched to 82 incidents during the reporting period, a slight increase on the previous year, and amongst the incidents we attended were the now infamous Loafers Lodge blaze in May 2023 (5th Alarm, with us attending multiple times over several days), another large structure fire incident in October (Ghuznee St, 3rd Alarm) and significant scrub fires at Whitirea in January (3rd Alarm) and Cannons Creek in February (3rd Alarm) with the Whitirea incident being the first in Wellington District to be declared a 'long duration' incident, under a new (interim) FENZ policy published in November 2023, those who attend a declared long-duration incident after the first 24 hours are eligible for a one-off gratuity payment in return for the time committed. Although we do not respond to emergencies expecting payment, this is a welcome contribution towards our costs associated with long-duration events, particularly for those of our members who are self-employed or required to take leave-without-pay in order to make themselves available.

We also continued in our role as a specialist Salvage Unit, with Wellington District providing us with a new 'Rössle' high-capacity Aquavac, the only unit of its type in Australasia, on an extended trial. This has been deployed at several incidents requiring salvage, including a 2nd Alarm fire incident at the Treasury on The Terrace, and another large salvage event at Victoria University of Wellington.

TRAINING

Initiatives largely driven by our lead Station Training Coordinator, Duncan Tabor, have seen us step up our inter-agency training tempo, with collaborations in this area including Wellington Coastguard and the USAR Light Rescue Teams from both Wellington and VUW – as well as our regular inter-OSU training activities. These have proven their worth at incidents where we've called upon our OS counterparts from Tawa, Remutaka and Wainuiomata, and also worked with Wellington Emergency Rescue Team at the Ghuznee St incident in October. I'd like to thank the members of our training team during the reporting period – particularly

Duncan Tabor, and the support provided by Alex Cousins and Cullum Peni-Wesche. Please see our STC's report for more about the year's training.

RECRUITMENT

The observer programme initiated in the previous reporting year was run twice during the 2023-2024 period, with the first group of three potential recruits joining us in the later part of 2023 for several training nights, guided by Blair Hillyard as programme lead. Of these, one new brigade member was selected – our first secondary-school-aged Recruit Firefighter still in high school, in recent memory. Welcome to the brigade, Dylan Wahapa!

With Blair having left the brigade in late 2023, I was grateful that Cullum Peni-Wesche picked up the baton of programme lead. After a bit of rework, a new-and-improved Observer/Recruitment initiative went live in February and this saw 10 potential recruits join us for several training nights. (And with the benefit of having written this report in August, we know that of those 10, 8 new recruits have signed-the-dotted-line and joined us!) I need to particularly recognise the hard work Cullum has done, improving on our public engagement / recruitment channel and updating the Observer programme to be even more effective. Bringing potential Recruits through a period of several weeks both observing and engaging (in a limited fashion) with an adapted version of our training programme, is definitely helping our recruitment pipeline and ensuring that there's a full understanding of the commitment that becoming one of our members, entails.

COMMUNITY RISK MANAGEMENT AND ENGAGEMENT

Our community engagement has continued, with the brigade again providing support to FENZ at the Emergency Services Open Day held at Te Papa (April 2023), the LifeFlight Open Day (March 2024) and attending the Kilbirnie Christmas event (the successor to the Kilbirnie Santa Parade). The Community Risk Management team also facilitated the procurement of a branded gazebo, which will provide a visible base for education and engagement events, and also support us for larger / longer duration events where shelter is required for victim support or crew recovery. It's first deployment was at the Relay for Life event in Upper Hutt earlier this year, which we used as an opportunity to fundraise for our team who took part in the Skytower Stairclimb Challenge later in 2024.

STRATEGY, PLANNING AND WIDER FENZ ENGAGEMENT

I have always sought to see the role of Operational Support understood, respected and embraced by our colleagues within FENZ and the wider emergency services community; to see our role and function recognised for the capabilities and value we bring, and to fight the tendency of our non-firefighting role positioning us as having 'second class' status when it comes to resourcing and strategic planning at all levels – District, Region and National.

Since I took up the role of OIC I have found our District leadership team – including our own Group Manager Mike Dombroski, the other GM's of the Wellington District with whom we work, and our District Manager (Nick Pyatt until February 2024; Brett Lockyer since) – to be approachable and supportive of our brigade. With their assistance, I will continue to drive progress on matters such as our fleet, equipment and personal protective equipment, our access to training and the suitability of FENZ-provided tools and processes to our unique role supporting FENZ in Wellington. An example of the support we see at District-level is the Operational Support Leaders Forum for Wellington District, chaired by GM Matthew Abel, which helps our Unit and those in Wainuiomata, Remutaka and Paraparaumu/Waikanae coordinate on areas of mutual interest.

A MILESTONE IN 2024

This being our 125th year, we're planning a celebration to mark this milestone, and will use the opportunity to present due honours and awards to several of our personnel. It is timely though, to take a moment and reflect on the changes that this brigade has seen (and been a part of!) in those 125 years... our anniversary celebration will be held in October, and planning is well underway. A little slice of our history can also be found as part of this report.

I invite you to read the rest of our Annual Report and thank you for your interest in Wellington's Operational Support Unit, and for your support throughout the year.

2. EMERGENCY RESPONSES

KEY RESPONSE STATISTICS

With a response count of 82 incidents during the reporting period, we're continuing to generally trend upwards in terms of turnout statistics – but of these, 26 events were recorded with no tasks carried out (stood down before arriving).

In terms of the duties we carry out at emergency scenes, Salvage has nudged its way back into the top-spot, with it having been carried out at 36 incidents – a mix of fire and non-fire related events. But Traffic Management follows closely behind (with 30 incidents), which goes to show the continuing importance of our role providing for the safety of both firefighters and the public at emergency incidents. It was also great to see operational firefighters calling on us for scene safety and traffic management tasks at non-fire events such as motor-vehicle accidents and HAZMAT calls.

Rounding out our typical duties at incidents we attend, is supporting the make-up of equipment, providing general incident logistics, and welfare tasks are starting to nudge upwards, both for the public (Victim Support) and for the welfare of emergency services workers (Crew Recovery).

Crewing requirements at incidents also continue to vary, but there were several events during the reporting period with 6 or more of our members recorded as having attended; the most extreme example was where we had 14 of our 17 operational members attend the Whitirea Scrub Fire event over the course of several days.

OPERATIONAL RESPONSE AREA

Wellington OSU's response area is the whole of Greater Wellington, from Pukerua Bay in the north (meeting Paraparaumu's southern edge) to Seatoun in the south-east; from the Makara Coast across to Korokoro where we intersect with the turnout areas of Remutaka and Wainuiomata OSU's.

Being based at Kilbirnie station does pose a challenge to our response times into the northern parts of our response area, but allowing direct-to-incident responses from our members who live some distance from Kilbirnie acts as a counter for this, particularly for responses into areas such as Karori & the western ward suburbs, the north Wellington wards and Porirua City. Our members living in these areas are able, under specific Standard Operating Procedures which include them being properly equipped with all appropriate Personal Protective Equipment, get to work supporting the needs of the incident even as our vehicles are just getting on the road.

Unfortunately, existing FENZ fire stations in more central locations (noting WOSU was once based at City station) are not considered suitable alternatives to the benefits of Kilbirnie's space and facilities, as well as its proximity to residential areas from which members can quickly respond to the station. Yet we remain committed to our responsibilities across the whole area, with strong relationships with our volunteer fire brigade colleagues from Newlands, Johnsonville, Porirua and others being key, as well as having members living in suburbs such as Karori, Ngaio, Wadestown and Johnsonville who can quickly respond and support both their local fire crews at incidents in their own communities.

MUTUAL AID ARRANGEMENTS

We must first acknowledge the support and friendship of Tawa Volunteer Fire Brigade and their crew of Operational Support personnel, with whom we regularly work on the fireground.

Further afield, we have mutual-support arrangements which see us working with our Operational Support colleagues based at Paraparaumu, Wainuiomata and Remutaka stations – and them responding into Wellington on request, particularly if we are managing a large or long-duration incident.

COMINGS AND GOINGS

Joining: Scott Maxim, of Upper Hutt Volunteer Fire Brigade (Trentham), and Milan Lukic of Whitianga Volunteer Fire Brigade, both transferred to Wellington OSU in late 2023 and brought with them significant

experience from their previous brigades. Both were allowed to retain their previous operational rank of QFF, despite their role change. Dylan Wahapa, who came to us via the Observer programme initiated in June 2023, completed his onboarding as a Recruit by October.

Departing: RFF Neal Yeates, who had initially engaged with us during the late 2022 Observer programme, and onboarded formally in January '23, had a change of personal circumstances and withdrew from the brigade just 6 months later in July 2023. Resignations were also received during the reporting period by SO Jono Ashman (personal circumstances), QFF Blair Hillyard (transfer to Tawa; retained as an Auxiliary Member), QFF Kelsey Scott (relocating to Australia), FF Bang Du (unable to maintain commitment) and FF Ethan Richardson (transfer to Tawa), and we noted the departure of Sam Lockett-Turton (who had remained on our books as an auxiliary member after transferring to Titahi Bay VFB previously) due to having relocated overseas.

ABOUT AUXILIARY MEMBERSHIP

In recent years the brigade has adopted the idea of auxiliary members; personnel with strong connections to WOSU whose primary association with FENZ is tied to another brigade, but who continue to support our response to incidents and events. The adoption of the AMS notification system has made it easier to enable personnel who maintain their operational competencies through another brigade, to directly support us and recent examples of this have included Sam Lockett-Turton (Titahi Bay), Blair Hillyard (Tawa) and Rhys Edlin (Remutaka). Response arrangements for auxiliary members are specifically agreed with the Officer in Charge.

RECRUITMENT

In addition to FENZ's Volunteer recruitment team continually referring volunteerism enquiries to us for the southern parts of Wellington, the work led by Cullum Peni-Wesche creating new recruitment posters and helping to drive interest in our early-2024 Observer intake has built a solid pipeline of potential recruits. At least 10 potential recruits entered our Observer programme in March 2024 (and as of August 2024, 8 of these have been onboarded). With the brigade now close to its full establishment, and with a current focus on ensuring that our newest recruits are brought up to operational training standards, I anticipate further recruitment decisions will be delayed until later in 2024.

6. MARKING OUR 125TH ANNIVERSARY

As the Brigade approaches a significant milestone, the 125th anniversary of its formation, there is much to commemorate. From its inception in 1899, the Brigade has continuously served Wellington and its communities. Achieving this milestone will not only be highlighted at the Annual General Meeting but also at a special honours function in mid-October 2024.

The Brigade's roots go back even further than it's unbroken lineage, with a number of forerunner organisations such as the Wellington Volunteer Fire Police Corps, which dates back to 1877. This early assembly, initiated by the Wellington City Rifle Corps, laid the groundwork for what would become a long-standing tradition of service and protection. Following several reorganisations over the years, the Wellington Rifles is now incorporated into 5th/7th Battalion, Royal New Zealand Infantry Regiment.

As an Operational Support Unit, we have adapted to meet the changing needs for fire and emergency services in Wellington, however we maintain a strong connection to the spirit of our original mandate. We were formed as a volunteer unit that provides support to frontline firefighters, undertake scene protection duties, engage with the community, and provide salvage operations and support.

As we look towards the Brigade's 125th anniversary, we celebrate not only its past achievements but also its future contributions to the safety and well-being of our community.

In the absence of a nationally coordinated rank progression system, we have established our own process for appointing Qualified and Senior Firefighters, based on an appropriate mix of skills assessment, demonstrated commitment to the brigade (through both incident response and non-operational commitment to administrative and community activities) and time-in-service. This process has been approved by our GM.

Promotions to QFF and SFF are recommended by the SSOIC and approved by the Group Manager.

Officer appointments are guided by the operational volunteer officer appointment criteria, adapted for our needs, and are approved by the District Manager.

9. TRAINING COORDINATORS REPORT

The Wellington Operational Support Unit has a lot to be proud of over the 2023/2024 FY.

Looking back, what stands out most is the concerted attempt to build awareness of outside groups (Coastguard, Police SAR, Vic Rescue NZRT-7, Wellington Emergency Response Team NZRT-8) and within FENZ such as the Wellington North Rural Brigade, the CRR Team, and other brigades through joint exercises. The training team delivered a wide variety of content despite challenges, helping our brigade to be ready to meet the needs of our communities.

Many of our members were able to attend FENZ courses, whether it be helping us work safely around rural fires – A key skill enabling us to respond to these ever increasing events, gaining NZQA credits, or attending the National OSU Recruits course. Congratulations especially to Zane Hunt, Sarah Grant, and Charlie Smith, for completing the Volunteer Operational Support programme.

The training team was challenged by low attendance, a lack of development to increase the team's knowledge, and by a lack of agility. The 2024/25 FY Offers a chance for the team to learn from these challenges, develop their skills as trainers, work to be more agile, and continue to deliver interesting, relevant, and useful training.

Looking forwards, I'm especially excited to see what the new cohort of recruits have to offer, and what we can do to enable them, as well as working through the Volunteer Operational Support Programme with them.
